"1 When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. 2 Then he began to speak, and taught them..."

-Mt. 5:1-2a



The above verses are the words from last weekend's gospel and the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. They are an inaugural address of epic proportion, and the genesis of Jesus' public ministry according to Matthew's gospel.

And yet...Jesus was able to deliver this message...while *sitting down*. Yes, he was on the mountain – a place reserved for God's message (fitting, as Jesus is Lord). And yes, it appears possible that only his disciples and a few others were there to hear his revelatory sermon (because he could sit and be heard by all). But if you are wondering what the significance of his being *seated* at the beginning might be, just look at his audience at the *end* of his sermon (chapter 7:28 – "when Jesus had finished saying these things, the *crowds* were astounded at his teaching.)

Jesus started with disciples, and ended with crowds.

This is how ministry often goes. A seed is planted, and within a short time it grows like wildfire. When I think of a movement that has grown from a small group of social ministry committee folks (in 2012) until a regular "crowd" of Safe Harbor at BLC today (just five years later), I think of Jesus speaking to that committee – a group of disciples, less than twelve at this church – which has blossomed into a multitude of faithful Bethlehemers who share a love of God and neighbor.

I hope you can join us for a "shift," or even an hour, this coming week as we host our friends from Safe Harbor, and throughout the community, during an often-bitterly cold time of year. There are also many new ways to do ministry in this place, perhaps even ministry opportunities not yet created. Have you been thinking of one, but have not yet found a vessel or an audience? I invite you to reach out to Council myself, or the Enlivening Christian Discipleship task force to see what new ministry we might form together. In the meantime, keep on the lookout for new ways of getting connected. Next up: Bonnie Newhouse's new ministry/program to help us identify our Spiritual Gifts starting Feb 5th on Sundays between services!

One special note: Deacon Julia Nelson has officially gone on bed rest for the remainder of her pregnancy. That means that she will be unable to work until that time (plus her maternity leave) concludes. We wish her and her family all the best for a safe, healthy and joyous next few months. Please send your prayers and thoughts to the Nelson family.

Lastly, if you are at all wondering on how we will continue to do ministry for youth, young adults and kiddos, do not fret; we are working on that as we speak! A senior high meeting for youth and their parents will be held on Wednesday, March 1 at 6pm – an hour before Ash Wednesday worship. We will discuss new ways to do youth ministry for the time being, and perhaps beyond. Confirmation, BLUES, and other Y2A ministry will keep moving – with your help and discipleship.

TREASURER UPDATE

December monthly numbers for the <u>General Fund</u> on a cash basis are shown below.

December	Actual	Budget	Variance	Key Message
Total Income	43,492	38,354	5,138	A one-time gift of \$5,000 for mortgage principal reduction accounts for the positive variance.
Total Expenses	39,007	4,221	4,786	This same one-time gift of \$5,000 for mortgage principal reduction accounts for the negative variance.
Over/Under	4,485	4,133		Not counting the \$5,000 gift, December actuals were very close to December budget.

The narrative for December is a good one. Our income for the month was \$43,492 which was \$5,138 greater than what was budgeted. This was due to a one-time gift of \$5,000 from a very generous donor that was designated for mortgage principal reduction. At the same time our expenses of \$39,007 were \$4,786 greater than budget, again due to the \$5,000 expense for mortgage principal reduction. The net result of the \$5,000 gift was basically a wash... \$5,000 more in income and \$5,000 more in expense. So December was a month where our income and expense closely matched budget.

The good news for 2016 is our deficit was only \$2,311. Ok, so using the words "good news" and "deficit" in the same sentence sounds odd. Considering we entered 2016 expecting a \$5,602 deficit and only ended up with a \$2,311 deficit is actually a good thing. Especially when you factor in the \$5,000 grant income that was never realized. Another reason to feel good is that beginning in the 4th quarter 2016 you started hearing warnings of a much larger deficit if income did not increase and expenses were not controlled. So all in all a \$2,311 deficit is much better than many of us feared. However a deficit is still a deficit and for 2017 the budget calls for <u>no</u> deficit. This 2017 zero deficit target will be our goal throughout the year.

- 2016 Total Operating Income was \$377,039 against a budget of \$361,285. See Key Message in table above for explanation.
- 2016 Total Other Income was \$11,909 against a budget of \$17,420. See Key Message in table above for explanation.
- 2016 Expense was \$391,259 against a budget of \$384,307. See Key Message in table above for explanation.

As reported in last month's STAR, the 2017 budget was passed at the December 11th Congregation Meeting. The presentation of the budget explained three key drivers for attaining a balanced budget. Those were...1) Increased giving of \$3,600 (1%), and 2) Increased transfer of \$2,000 from the Challenge Grant from \$4,000 to \$6,000 and 3) a generous gift of stock that will contribute approximately \$4,500 to the General Fund and \$5,000 to mortgage principal reduction. 2017 will be a challenging year but certainly attainable.

And the more our task force talked about the possibilities of a real "old-fashioned" church picnic with worship and picnic at the Civic Center, the more excited we got! Pastor Paul added the possibility of tying July's **Jubilee Sunday on July 30** with the historical end of our celebration. So the ideas keep flowing. Share any you might have.

Our task force has worked hard over the last year to bring out the importance of being a family of God in this place and how much an asset we are to the community in our witness to faith in Jesus. Join us in our enthusiasm and invite others, especially former members to share in whatever way they can.



In 2016, the BLC Endowment Committee has worked hard to follow its mission of funding projects on a local and global level. Our diversified Vanguard Funds yielded almost \$10,000 in interest this year, and we granted monies to the following organizations:

Salem Lutheran Church in Flint for the Water Crisis Peter Dougherty House on Old Mission Peninsula Bethlehem Lutheran Church for the electronic kiosk in the narthex ELCA World Hunger Safe Harbor ELCA Vision Mission Third Level Crisis Center Lutheran World Relief/Hurricane Matthew Love, Inc.

Since its inception in July 2000, the Endowment Fund has received gifts totaling **\$108,134**. We have given out **\$73,640**. The breakdown includes:

\$3,500 for *health-related charity*, \$15,750 for *educational missions*, \$37,740 for *Human Services*, \$3,500 for *environmental causes*, \$ 9,150 for *faith-based projects*, and \$4,000 for *disaster relief*.

Our current balance of funds is still at more than **\$121,000**, and our money continues to work for us!

ROOF UPDATE

Many of you probably walked around the water buckets in the narthex, between the sanctuary and coat room, due to the recent leaky roof. First one hole was found and patched in the roof and then when the leak did not stop, two more holes were located and patched. This type of roof has stone on top of the roofing membrane so leaks are hard to find. This leaky roof is the oldest flat roof on the church building. We have no other roofs of this type since all other roofs of this type have been replaced in the last few years. Fortunately, the leaky roof is not a large area, and is only about 750 square feet. We are in the process of getting a proposal for the replacement of this roof so we will know what a permanent fix will cost and thus can make plans for its replacement.

Anniversary Time Capsule

Church membership grew so rapidly after WWII, with the help of new pastor, Rev. J. Grant Carlson, that a new church building was needed for the more than 300 members. Property was purchased at the corner of Peninsula Drive and Garfield, and a building was designed by Gordon Cornwell in 1952. Our current church building was dedicated on October 24, 1954. of Christ was transported to the new church, and the old buildings on Washington Street were sold to the Church of God for \$15,000.
