Friends, there are so many great verses from 1 John 4, also known as the 2nd lesson for Sunday, May 2nd (also known as the 5th Sunday after Easter!) This is the week when Jesus tells us that he “is the vine, and we are the branches,” and also the week when John’s letter tells us that “God is love” and that to love one another is to love God.

Christ’s message of connection (to the “de-vine”) and John’s message of love are essentially one in the same. We love because God loved us, and we are connected with life and love because we are connected by grace to God. This month of May is one in which Bethlehem looks forward with hope to new connections, new relationships and hopefully new freedoms to gather more fully together as the spring and summer progress. We continue to worship both **in-person** (in the sanctuary and parking lot communion) and **virtually** (via our new live stream setup and with continued Wednesday night “2.0” content.)

For Wednesday nights, David Husser, Zeke Clemons and I are working to create new music and a more pared-down format for “2.0” soon. The thought is to **(1) try new music styles** (perhaps Jazz, Contemporary, etc) as well as **(2) shorten the total Wednesday service time** to more like 20 minutes instead of 30 to 40 minutes. For example, you may see something called “Rhythm and Hymns” soon along with “A Taste of Taize” and “A Touch of Holden” in the weeks ahead. We plan for these worship opportunities to be a little less polished, but no less meaningful. Other NEW additions to our virtual content are the “almost-final” versions of my sermons each weekend – called “Take 2” – with the goal of having just the sermon uploaded each Saturday by 5pm, along with the occasional Facebook Live check-in by Pastor Paul, as time permits.

All the virtual content mentioned above will be found either on our current Facebook video page or our NEW YouTube Live Stream account. **You can also find the links for those online offerings at www.bethlehemtc.org/live-stream.** We hope you enjoy.

Finally, I mention all the above, with one eye on keeping Bethlehem’s new electronic presence alive and the other eye on balancing our online connections with ministry that becomes more and more personal and in-person-. As we further emerge from the fog and restrictions of our Covid-19 reality, my prayer is that we might find new ways to be church – using some of the ways we used to be, and some of the new ways we get to be. Zoom meetings won’t always be a necessity, but they are now always an option. And if we can take away anything from the past year, it’s that God has given us more avenues to connect with one another. So we hold both the past and the future in the ever-revealed present... and we ask for The Spirit’s guidance while searching for new staffing, teamwork and vision in the days and weeks ahead.

Please join me as we move forward always – together, on this journey – with God and with love. Shalom, and do not be afraid.

Covid Positivity and Sanctuary Seating at Bethlehem – April 22, 2021

History: At the February 2021 Bethlehem Council meeting, a rule to help safely open and guide Bethlehem's sanctuary "maximum seating" capacity was adopted, called "**the 5 and 7 rule**": that if the 14-Day rolling average for Covid positivity dipped below 5% in Grand Traverse County, we would meet to consider re-opening the sanctuary, and if the 14-Day positivity rose back up to 7% or higher we would meet again to reconsider closing. On March 7th, with a 14-Day positivity of less than 5%, BLC re-opened the sanctuary to 60 max seating in the sanctuary, 60 max overflow with audio overflow in the Fellowship Hall and 10 more people in the Gathering Space. Those numbers were adjusted slightly higher for Holy Week and Easter, but within a few days the positivity numbers in GT County had surged to over 14% (twice our self-imposed limit), where it has hovered ever since.

In response, a special Council meeting was held Thursday, April 15th to weigh several options (including going back to virtual-only or holding regular outdoor worship for the spring) and Council *approved the latest recommendation from the New Normal Task Force: continuing worship indoors Sundays at 10am but lowering max capacity in the sanctuary, Fellowship Hall and Gathering space to 40 occupants, 40 occupants, and 10 occupants, respectively.*

Moving Forward: At the regular April Council meeting on 4/20, the rule or "formula" was revisited. We hope to increase those max capacity numbers soon as (1) more GT residents get vaccinated and (2) Covid positivity numbers begin to drop. The new formula follows more of a "7 / 10 / 13" set of triggers, as follows (note: as of 4/22/21, the 14-Day is around 12%).

- By the Thursday prior to Sunday worship, when the 14-Day positivity in Grand Traverse County dips to **10% or below**, BLC will immediately increase capacity to 60 people in the sanctuary, 60 in Fellowship Hall and 10 in the Gathering Space (130 total in the building).
- When the 14-Day dips to **7% or below** on the Thursday prior to Sunday worship (that lag is to get the word out), BLC increases the max. capacity to 100 occupants in sanctuary, 60 in FH, 10 in GS (170 total in-building)
- If numbers increase, the triggers work in reverse; if the 14-Day increases to **13% or more**, we return to the current 40/40/10 capacity ratio. A surge greater than 13% would require further deliberation.

Thank you always for your understanding, patience and cooperation. We look forward to the day when Covid and seating restrictions / max capacities will be a thing of the past.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

- 1.) Leonard received a call from Judy Strickland to "thank the council and all involved in the church during COVID-19."

- 3.) Leonard received a Thank You note for our recent donation to the Salvation Army.

PASTOR'S REPORT:

- 1.) Pastor Paul discussed the need for coverage while he is on vacation. The Synod has put together a service for April 11th. There is a need for people to lead the service and there may be a virtual communion, or there can be a service without communion.

- 4.) Table for 12 will be recorded with Live Stream equipment. Live Stream will start on April 18th or 24th and may appear clunky at first. Pastor will have the remote to start and another person may be needed if there are problems.

FINACIAL SERCRETARY REPORT:

Jim Monroe reports the first 2 weeks in March the income has been up. Mark McPherson mentioned there have been 76 pledges turned in in 2021 and there were 100 pledges in 2020.

Jim also discussed the COVID-19 numbers, there has been an uptick in the county, mostly younger people who have not been vaccinated.

CONSENT CALENDAR: COMMITTEE REPORTS: The committee reports are: Financial Secretary's report, Financial and Executive Committee report, Christian Care Report, Christian Education Report, Membership and Evangelism, Personnel Report, Property Report, Stewardship Report, Worship and Music, Youth/Y2A Report, Fellowship Report, Visions Report, Endowment Fund Report (Quarterly) and Sustaining Endowment Memorial Fund Report (Quarterly). All reports submitted and filed

OLD BUSINESS:

- A. Update from Sacred Ground, Leonard reported he and Gail Goldsmith attended a zoom meeting with Sacred Ground and the Wildlife Federation. Paul Wiemerslage, Leonard and Gail are setting up meetings to get the garden started, involving church members and youth for planning, preparation, planting and caring for the garden.
- B. Update on Payroll Protection Plan Jim Monroe reported he has made the application for the loan and he should hear from Huntington Bank in 7-10 days for the approval. (He reported on the 18th the loan was approved for \$127,125.)
- C. Update on Pastoral Renewal, Maureen Bauer reported on a program called Clergy Renewal. Maureen made the motion to give our pastor a Clergy Renewal for 3 consecutive weeks in July, 2021. Mark McPherson seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion included there is a Lilly Grant to help pay for the release time. This is not a vacation, but a time for the Clergy to refresh and to protect our pastor from this stressful year.
- D. Update on Sabbatical for Pastor Mark McPherson discussed the Sabbatical for Pastor. It takes time to plan and so the Clergy Renewal will give time to plan for a Sabbatical. This is tabled until the April meeting.
- E. Update on Food Kiosk, Leonard reported on the cabinet. Norm Fred and Leonard are working on a cabinet to put doors on it to make it weatherproof. It was suggested to look at outdoor cupboards such as Rubbermaid. They will look into that.

NEW BUSINESS:

- A. Easter Services was discussed, there will be a virtual service at 9:00 a.m., Indoor Service at 8:30 a.m., outdoor services at 10:00 and Parking lot communion at 11:00 a.m. on Easter Sunday. Good Friday both Virtual and In Person service at 7:00 p.m. Pastor will be one of the pastors giving the Good Friday service at Central United Methodist Church from 12:00 noon until 3:00 p.m.
- B. Two Services: Mark McPherson made the motion to increase the capacity as warranted up to 100 people in the sanctuary, Cindy Monroe seconded, the motion carried. Discussion was to increase the amount of people coming to church, before we look at having 2 services on Sunday.
- C. Annie's maternity leave: Maureen Bauer made the motion to set up an Ad Hoc Committee to come up with a policy on Maternity Leave by the April Council meeting, Cindy Monroe seconded the motion, the motion carried. The Ad Hoc Committee is Phil Anderson, Mark McPherson and Maureen Bauer.
- D. Non-ELCA benevolence funding: Jan Stretlien mad the motion to give the quarterly benevolent funds to the Sacred Beginning in Grand Rapids, this program is to stop human trafficking and to meet with women who are walking the streets. Mark McPherson seconded the motion, the motion carried.
- E. Coverage for Pastor's vacation, April 11th: Maureen Bauer made the motion to have an in person Lay Minister to lead worship, with a virtual sermon, prerecorded music and parking lot communion. Cindy Monroe seconded the motion, the motion carried.

Seconded by Nancy Downer, the motion carried. Discussion: This allows the church building to be open since so many of the congregation have had their vaccinations. We will continue to take temperatures, do contact tracing, wear masks, social distance and no singing, but humming instead. We need to continue to look at the numbers of COVID cases in the county to make decisions of safety for the congregation.

Music Director/Administrative Assistant Position: Mark McPherson made the motion to send Sharon Weller a letter to respectfully decline her offer to be involved with the transition planning for the new Administrative Assistant and Music Director. Also to decline her use of the church and equipment for teaching piano lessons. And to have her meet with Pastor Paul to return church property and to pick up her personal belongings. Maureen Bauer seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion: Mark McPherson and Maureen Bauer will compose the letter together. Sharon is able to rent out the space if she chooses to continue piano lessons at the church.

To those who recently helped with one of the most audacious cleanup projects in the city's history.

The target was a series of homeless encampment near and below the Goodwill Inn on Keystone Road. When the work detail was over, volunteers had bagged and filled an American Waste truck with a staggering 6 tons of garbage that had been accumulating for years on the property, part of which is owned by the city and part of which belongs to Garfield Township.

Afterward, the organizer of the cleanup, retired dentist Norm Fred, the indefatigable 81-year-old founder of the nonprofit Boardman River Clean Sweep, was ecstatic.

“I've done a lot of cleanups, but this was the biggest one-day cleanup we've ever done, by far, in terms of the amount of trash,” he said. “Cleaning that up was a triumph.”


HONORING GOD'S CREATION

FINANCIAL NEWS


March income came in at \$28,658 compared to a budget of \$32,457 resulting in a shortage of income against budget of \$3,799. On the expense side we came in at \$32,962 compared to a budget of \$33,645 resulting in spending \$684 under budget. From a purely budget perspective the shortfall was \$3,115. From a cash flow perspective, income of \$28,658 did not cover expense of \$32,962 leaving us short \$4,304 for the month.

Year to date income came in at \$82,435 compared to a budget of \$95,866 resulting in a shortage of income against budget of \$13,431. On the expense side we came in at \$90,047 compared to a budget of \$96,166 resulting in spending \$6,118 under budget. From a purely budget perspective the shortfall was \$7,313. From a cash flow perspective, income of \$82,435 did not cover expense of \$90,047 leaving us short \$7,612 year to date.

Last month BLC applied for and was approved for a government Payroll Protection Plan (PPP) loan in the amount of \$27,125. The \$27,125 loan proceeds were deposited in our general checking account. The intent of the loan was to ensure BLC had adequate monies available to maintain current staffing levels in light of the economic uncertainties from the pandemic. From a Balance Sheet perspective we have an asset of \$27,125 (money in the checking account) and the offsetting liability PPP Loan. The PPP loan program allows for the loan to be forgiven as long as the money is used for approved expenses like salaries, utilities, mortgage interest, etc. We are tracking our salary dollars against the \$27,125 and once we reach that spending limit ... probably in June ... we will apply for loan forgiveness. We anticipate the loan will be forgiven during the third quarter, at which time the PPP Loan liability line on the Balance Sheet will be removed. Said another way, the government PPP loan program was designed to help small business and religious organizations stay open during the pandemic with necessary funding for essential expenses.



ELCA - International Woman Leader – Amanda William Sabah Theological Seminary – Malaysia



In the state of Sabah in Malaysia, (on Borneo Island), **International Women Leaders 2020 graduate Amanda William** recently founded Safe Campus, an organization that raises awareness about sexual harassment at higher education institutions. Amanda and co-founder Christyne Surindai have started a Safe Campus social media campaign, produced a video and led an online workshop. Faye Lee, another graduate of the ELCA's International Women Leaders scholarship program, wrote about Safe Campus for the *Vulcan Post*.

The ELCA is a church that believes Jesus is God's "Yes" to us. Our lives can be a "Yes" to others. Today, women represent 70 percent of the world's population living in poverty and are often underserved by a lack of access to education and training.

The ELCA believes the time has come for a strong, strategic emphasis on supporting and empowering international women leaders in the life and development of the church and society.

Through the **ELCA International Women Leaders** program, we are boldly investing in established and emerging women leaders from our global companion churches. As an aside, Carolyn Mann states: "I have been to a graduation ceremony, at this seminary on the island of Borneo in 1998. It was a very moving experience for me. 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
