Days in the Desert...

For each of the past few years I have made it a point to watch the 2015 Rodrigo Garcia film *Last Days in the Desert* before the season of Lent begins. It's a wonderful movie about Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness following his baptism and before he re-enters the "real world" to begin his formal ministry. How often do we think of those 40 days of Christ? Do they seem more like days of sabbath or days of trial and temptation? Scripture says very little about those 40 days. We know that angels cared for Jesus. We know that Satan tested his resolve, faith and loyalty... But without a creative interpretation like Garcia's to fill in the blanks, we might simply gloss over those 40 days as being just like any other. In the movie, Jesus meets a family high in the hills of desert country. The family consists of three characters who are "anonymous" – biblically and literally (none of whom have names), yet what they learn from one another and Jesus is profound. What Jesus takes away from his own experience, too, is worth the watch.

What will these next 40 days be like for us? Will they be a times of sabbath and rest, or days where we feel our sense of resolve and faith challenged? Will they be a time for us to "gear up" as Jesus did before starting a whole new chapter and ministry in our lives, or will they be a way to take stock in the blessings that we have? Perhaps it will be all of those things and more for you. But as we walk this journey together, I invite you to join me as we take an eclectic walk through Lenten Wednesdays (and Sundays) together.

We will start Lent with **Ash Wednesday, March 2nd at 7pm** in the sanctuary – both in-person and via livestream for those at home. Each Wednesday evening thereafter, we will gather at Bethlehem at 6pm for what we're calling "Simple Soup at Six" – with other sides like salad and bread. At 6:30 we will gather in the sanctuary for a brief worship with the music from Holden Evening Prayer, Taize, and other selections. Our theme this year is "The Message and the Messenger," as we compare the "who" of the Christ to the "what and how" of the message God sends to us this Lent. We will read side-by-side the NRSV version of the Lenten bible texts and Eugene Peterson's *The Message* translation. And we will pay special note to this question: "Who and what is this Message who is also the Messenger for us?"

On a personal note, I wanted to say a deep and heartfelt thank you to all those who are helping put together a pastoral sabbatical in 2023. Many, many thanks - to them and you – for all your support and mutual ministry.

I leave you with the continuation from the verse above. "I lift my eyes from the hills, from where will my help come...?" The desert answers: "My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

See you soon, and God bless.

Ash Wednesday this year for me is late. This also means that Easter will be farther into April and maybe with some early flowers popping up from a sunny spot in the ground. I always get confused when Easter comes. (There is also a full moon involved!) It is 40 days after Ash Wednesday buy you don't count the Sundays. Otherwise it will be 46 days. My former Pastor would say that the Sundays are "in Lent but not of Lent". The 40 days, of course, is the 40 days and 40 nights that Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness.

January income was \$25,298 compared to a budgeted income of \$30,123 or a shortfall of \$4,825. Expenses were \$32,218 compared to a budget of \$31,334 resulting in spending \$794 more than budgeted. On a cash basis, expenses exceeded income by \$5,830.

MINUTES TO CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING: January 18, 2022

CALL TO ORDER: Mark McPherson, President called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m.

OPENING PRAYER: Jim Hinds read a poem, "Endeavor To Persevere" by George Wootton, Hebrews 12 and prayed.

ROLL CALL: Gail Goldsmith, Secretary; Maureen Bauer, Pastor Paul Busekist, Scott Farley, Leonard Graf, Jim Hinds, Mark McPherson, Cindy Monroe, Jim Monroe, Paul Wiemerslage were all present. Denice Bossardet, Laura Hahn and Gail Goldsmith were present through Zoom.

VISITOR/S OR CONGREGATIONAL COMMENT: no visitors

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: Cindy Monroe made the motion to approve the agenda, Maureen Bauer seconded the motion, and the agenda was approved.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM: Maureen made the motion to approve the December 21, 2022 minutes, Cindy Monroe seconded the motion. The minutes were approved.

REPORTS:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Mark McPherson made a personal reflection.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor Paul reports January is a month for new beginnings. He is trying out a few challenges for himself as a person and a pastor.

His focus at BLC this coming month is 3-fold: 1. Working to get back to live stream and a solid sound system in the sanctuary for live worship, 2. Preparing a more relational ministry in the year 2022 and 3. Working with the council to "plan to get a plan" for visioning work at Bethlehem either late spring or early fall.

- Pastor has been working with 3 vendors for the sound system and presented their invoices to the council.
- Pastor is working on a more relational ministry for more personal and less structured commitments. These will unfold organically. He is planning some Continuing Education time at the end of the month to work on some leadership development and spiritual direction. Ruth Overdier will preach and preside on January 30, 2022.
- To bring more effort to get more intentional about our visioning focus at BLC. This will need the help of the Council and a visioning task force at some point

TREASURER'S REPORT: Leonard Graf reported; December expenses exceeded income by \$10,570. Due to 2 light bills being paid In December as it was not paid in November, there were 3 pay periods in December and the Property Committee replaced some lights. For the 2021 year expenses were over income by \$7341. The PPP loan was not included in these figures. With the PPP loan the income was \$19,000 over expenses for the year.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT: Jim Monroe reports December income is \$1834 under the amount needed for the monthly budget. Year to Date contributions through December are \$22, 455 under budget. The expenses with the PPP loan, we came out ok. There is money in the checking account for 2022, with the reduction in the budget and the forecasted amount of giving.

COVID update: As of last Thursday Grand Traverse County was at 22 ½% rolling average. It is important the church continue to have everyone wear masks over their nose and mouth. Munson continues to report they are short staffed and report their staff is at 99% compliance.

CONSENT CALENDAR: COMMITTEE REPORTS: The committee reports are; Treasurer's report; Financial Secretary's report; Financial and Executive Committee report; Christian Care; Fellowship; Membership and Evangelism; Personnel; Property; Stewardship; Worship and Music; Youth/Y2A; All reports are submitted and on file.

OLD BUSINESS:

- A. Personnel, Sick Leave Policy: Maureen Bauer presented the new Sick Leave for Non-Rostered (At Will) Employees policy. Full time staff will accrue sick leave at a rate of one-half day per month worked. Part-time employees, those under 32 hours, may accrue paid sick leave at a rate of one hour every 30 hours worked. Sick leave begins to accrue from the first day of employment. Additionally, sick leave may be accumulated up to a maximum of 40 hours. Staff members who accumulate benefit allowed will not earn additional sick leave.
 - Unused sick pay benefits may not be used for personal time off or as additional vacation, and staff members will not be paid unused sick leave upon termination of employment. Sick leave will to be considered as hours worked for the calculation of overtime. The Church reserves the right to request written physicians excuse for any sick leave used by an employee. Leonard Graf made the motion to accept the Sick Leave Policy, Scott Farley seconded they motion. The motion carried.
- B. Y2A/Christian Education update: Paul Wiemerslage reports Y2A and Christian Education are continuing to meet together. Due to COVID the pancake breakfast is canceled, they ski trip is changed to 2-26-22 at Chrystal Mountain for 10:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The Youth Gathering Registration is on hold for now. Christian Education guideline to be pursued and to look closely at the policy for Children to adult ratio and background checks. They are looking at possibly having an Easter breakfast this year.
- C. Music Director Position: Cindy Monroe made the motion to hire Tony Bero as the part time Choir Director/Music Supervisor for BLC. Maureen seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion: Tony is the Music Director of Immanuel Lutheran Church in Suttons Bay and is willing to work with BLC Choir and help Cindy ad Kate organize the music for Sunday morning worship. Since he is directing on Sundays at Immanuel he will not be present on Sundays at BLC, but can be present for rehearsals and special concerts on other days of the week. He is compensated according to his Employment agreement.
- D. Refresh Committee: No report at this time
- E. Sabbatical Committee Update: Gail Goldsmith made the motion to approve a 12 week Sabbatical for Pastor Paul Busekist in 2023. Maureen Bauer seconded the motion, the motion carried.
- F. Sabbatical Funding: Gail Goldsmith made the motion for BLC to make an application to the Lilly Endowment for a Grant for the purpose of funding the costs for Pastor Paul's Sabbatical. Cindy Monroe seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion: There is a committee meeting currently to help Pastor plan the Sabbatical and to apply for they grant money. There will be communication to the congregation in the "Bethlehem Star" and at the Congregational meetings. There will also be plans in place if the grant is not received as there is only a 50/50 chance the grant application will be accepted.

G. Sound System: Paul Wiemerslage made the motion to allow the President or Vice President of BLC Council at authorize expenditures up to \$13,000 for critical sound equipment replacement. Jim Hinds seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion: Pastor Paul Busekist reported on the situation with the sound system. He has received quotes from 3 vendors and is negotiating rental equipment as it may take months to have the equipment installed due to supply chain issues.

Amendment to motion: An amendment was made to the motion by Leonard Graf for the funds to come from a combination of Asset Replacement Funds from the Sustaining Endowment Funds, Cash Reserves, or other sources. Cindy Monroe seconded the amendment, the amendment carried. Discussion: to have a Temple Talk to see if there are interested parties to donate to the sound system.

NEW BUSINESS:

- A. Property Committee/Lease Renewal on the rental house: Leonard Graf made the motion to continue to lease the home at 1020 Peninsula Dr. for 1 year. Cindy Monroe seconded the motion, the motion carried. Discussion was at some point the Church may consider selling the home to pay off the church mortgage and provide updates to the church. Scott Farley agreed to make an analysis on the home to see what the home is worth and to form an Ad Hoc committee to make the best plan for the home and the church. In the meantime, there are good tenants in the home and the bills are being paid. The church is providing a good home for a reasonable price.
- B. Use of Fellowship Hall for WELCA: WELCA's use of the Fellowship Hall does not need to come to the Council for approval, but they need to follow COVID mask protocol while in the church.

VISITOR OR CONGREGATIONAL COMMENTS: NA

SHEPHERDING A SABBATICAL-PART 2

What?.... a sabbatical? It is exciting and scary all at the same time!!! This congregation will be without its regular leader for 12 weeks. This is a chance for Pastor Paul to be nurtured and grow and to bring that growth back to us. However, it is also a time when each of us can experience our own spiritual, emotional, and mental growth at the same time. That is the challenge before all of us.

Why a Sabbatical now? The better question may be, why NOT now? Our intrepid leader of personnel has been doing everything possible to work on staff contentment and retention. In this time of "great resignation" we want to keep the people who are working hard for us. One way we know we can do this is to follow the teachings of scripture which were shared in the previous STAR article and provide that important time of rest. A pastor is actually on duty 24/7 to tend to his flock. That's a big burden for both a pastor and his family to carry. The only way to maintain the endurance and stamina is to take adequate time away from all of the cares and needs of others and come back rejuvenated.

<u>Will it be expensive?</u> Right now the "Shepherds" of the sabbatical (Sabbatical Committee) are working very hard on the application to the Lilly Foundation so that the cost will be nothing. So, please take time now and pray for our success in writing this grant. Even if we do not receive this grant we have committed to having Pastor Paul take his sabbatical in the summer of 2023. Some dreams may have to be pared back, and there may be a request for more volunteers from the congregation. It is possible, however, to have this sabbatical occur without making the congregation feel financially overwhelmed.

<u>How will Bethlehem benefit?</u> BLC will benefit from having a pastor who is "in tune" with himself, nature, God, family, and this congregation. He will be in a better position to envision the future of BLC. It is so telling that the grant application repeatedly asks the pastor, "What will make your heart sing?" We have a very "musical" pastor, but is his heart really singing now so that he can share the joy of faith and grace with all of us?

Is there something I should be doing now? As mentioned above, you can already be praying for the success of the committee in completing their Lilly application. You can also be thinking of questions you may have for the Sabbatical forum which will occur during the service on March 20, 2022. Instead of a sermon, we will have an open discussion about the sabbatical to hear your questions, concerns, ideas, etc. It will be a time to brainstorm for the time of the Sabbatical and the future of BLC. If we don't finish, those who would like can stay after the service to share more.

What can I do to help during the Sabbatical? There may be many more ideas that occur after the March 20 meeting, but some immediate thoughts are: PRAY, increase your volunteering beyond your comfort zone to be a: greeter, usher, lay reader, lay assistant, committee member, money counter, AV helper, prayer chain member...Could you even give a sermon!?!? If the hospital allows, you could visit the ill or assist the flower brigade with their weekly visitation and dispersal of flowers. You can help with planning a wonderful party for Pastor Paul's return complete with an "official" (or unofficial) Pastor Paul Parody led by the choir but with all chiming in on the chorus. The sky is the limit.

Bethlehem's Safe Harbor Ministry for 2022

A cadre of enthusiastic volunteers, charged with Christ's message to love and serve our neighbors, supported our ministry to persons experiencing homelessness during our period of Safe Harbor service, February 5-9. 60 to 70 men and women guests each night were given a hot evening meal and a safe place to sleep at the Safe Harbor Emergency Housing Shelter on Wellington Street. Through their gift of service BLC volunteers acted as the hands, feet, and soul of Jesus. And there is a return gift to us: the gift of recognition that the Safe Harbor guests are our neighbors worthy of support, encouragement, and love, rather than persons to be avoided and rendered invisible.






A Reflection from the Rev. Rachel Eskesen, Director, ELCA Europe Desk

I was first invited to serve internationally with the ELCA as a Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) volunteer at St. Andrew's Refugee Ministries (now St. Andrew's Refugee Services, or StARS) in Cairo, Egypt, in 2004. When I responded "YES!" to this call to serve, I couldn't have imagined how the experience would continue to impact and inform my vocational discernment.

Years later, during seminary, I felt a continuous pull toward global ministry and explored it further as an ELCA Horizon International intern in Bratislava, Slovakia. After graduating from seminary, I returned to the ELCA's global ministries when I accepted a call to serve, first in an interim and then in a permanent capacity, as YAGM Central Europe Country coordinator.

Two years have passed since I began serving as area desk director for Europe on Feb. 1, 2020. Thus far my entire tenure has unfolded amid the COVID-19 pandemic. Now more than ever, we are called to courageous vulnerability in life. I'm grateful for the ministry partners who've joined us in our collaborative attempt to live fully into God's mission in our world.
