## Dear friends at Bethlehem,



We have all wondered these last few weeks just where we are as a church during this era of COVID-19 and how we hope to *live into* and *through it*. Our Council has chosen unanimously to follow our state governor's Executive Order and (beyond that) the recommendation of our synod bishop, by postponing in-person worship until May 10<sup>th</sup>. This will not be easy, and your pastor, Council and staff have been prayerfully seeking to transform their roles and efforts to help us all stay connected to one another and God's word and presence in our lives.

Among other things, we've created two big new pieces of our website – our "Hope Spreads Further" blog and our pre-recorded videos called "Real Church Virtual." Both are accessible via the scrolling web banner at <a href="www.bethlehemtc.org">www.bethlehemtc.org</a>, under the "Our Stories" drop-down menu, on Facebook and on YouTube. We continue to search for new avenues of outreach and creativity, from building a temporary outdoor mailbox to putting STAR newsletters and other BLC printed materials (and DVD worship recordings) into the new "Shooting STAR Box" outside the church door. We also actively reach out to each other one on one. All of these help, as we can all do something big or small to avoid social isolation, despite our physical distance.

Bethlehem has also re-drawn the schedule for Holy Week (below) and the events shortly after. Perhaps this list, and the special note from Stewardship we are mailing this week may serve as something helpful to post on your fridge or home office wall. We hope to see and hear from you soon, and we give thanks for your prayers and words each day as we walk this journey together... We can't be church without you!

## "Anchor of Hope"

When I was a child, my church was Hope Lutheran in Detroit. As an adult, I belonged to Hope Lutheran in Dearborn. The symbol for those congregations was the "anchor of hope," as described in the book of Hebrews. From the time I was a young teenager, I have claimed the promise that "we have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope ... where Jesus a forerunner on our behalf has entered..." (Hebrews 6:19-20a)

There are many examples of how this assurance has been helpful to me through the years – sometimes involving people – sometimes involving incidents in my daily life.

There was one time at Christmas I will always remember. The congregation my husband was serving was a small one and although congregational giving was excellent, oftentimes there were financial struggles. David commented to me that the church needed \$8,000 and would be in dire straits at the end of the year unless there was a miracle. We needed to hope and pray. That same evening, a couple from church stopped by the house. They had received a settlement from an auto accident and wanted to tithe it. Their gift was \$8,000!

My main point in sharing this information is so that, despite the upset in our lives now, despite the fears we may have about health or money, or loved ones, remember to trust the anchor in our lives – Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Cling to the anchor of hope. Jesus has promised to be with us until the close of the age. Be grateful for this reassurance. The Lord is with each of us at Bethlehem.



So naturally, you can imagine that this stay at home order is making her pretty ancy--like it is all of us. The other day was too nice to just sit around the house and she found herself walking down the road in the subdivision where my parents live. She was pleasantly surprised to see so many people in their yards or walking as well. While on a nice day this wouldn't be abnormal, what caught my mom's attention was that everywhere she turned people were being kind to each other. Usually, we've both found that people don't speak or smile at each other anymore. They are just in their own little worlds and keep to themselves. She's noticed during the few times that she's ventured out since the Stay Home Order that people are keeping their distance but are now waving, smiling and talking to each other. There is more kindness and noticing of others around us.

Psalm 31:21 states "Blessed be the LORD for he has wondrously shown his steadfast love to me when I was beset as a city under siege." I like to think that in times of crisis, people's kindness comes bursting out of them. 




## **HONORING GOD'S CREATION**
