Bethlehem friends,

–Psalm 23:1,6b

First of all...deep breath. This is a new type of world we are living in right now, and a new type of "STAR" article we read and are essentially "co-writing" together. As your pastor, I have been giving a lot of thought lately to the 23rd Psalm and what it means to be shepherded in tough times. This is also a psalm about *place*, and how Christ meets us in our sacred spaces. More later in that regard...

For now, I would like to ask you all just <u>two questions</u> regarding the eventual re-opening of *our sacred space at Bethlehem. (Feel free to email me at <u>paul.busekist@bethlehemtc.org</u> or Chuck with your feedback.) These questions are being discussed by leaders at BLC, as follows: Knowing that BLC has never been able to, nor could in the future, "guarantee" attendees won't be vulnerable to infections of any sort while gathering,*

1.) What would make you feel *as safe as possible* worshiping and gathering at Bethlehem? 2.) What would make you feel that our precautions would *actually keep you from attending* at this time?

From there, we look at the bigger prep items and the smaller details, with BLC leadership discussing points like:

- BLC may go to A.) just one service/weekend on Sundays for the short term, minimizing deep cleaning needs between services, or B.) keep one service on Saturday/one on Sunday. (Option A keeps it simple for now.) If the choice is A, when we expand to include a Saturday service it may be outdoors (for deep cleaning needs) or we could establish a team of people to clean bathrooms and surfaces post-gathering. (Saturdays could start sometime after our "opening weekend," possibly resuming worship as early as Sunday, June 7th, subject to restrictions by the Governor on timing, gathering size, etc.)
- How long should we do pre-recorded **virtual worship** before phasing into possible **live-streaming worship**? (One idea = virtual worship until September, live-streaming beyond, provided we have the resources to do it.)
- We may not offer communion at the outset, but afterwards place it outside the order of worship, e.g. after the end of the service in a different room (Fellowship Hall or Parking Lot) where we can spread out. (*TBD*) For now, all non-communion food from Finger Food and Fellowship to potlucks should be postponed.
- We will look to re-task worship leaders like ushers, etc., to help keep social distancing and minimize surface touching (e.g. worship folder distribution). We will need p*lenty of education beforehand, and <u>facemasks and</u> <u>distancing will be required</u>. The hope is that all people entering the premises will bring their own facemasks and any other desired PPE, with masks made available for those who may have forgotten their own, procured with funds or made by volunteers with cloth. These could be kept/re-used by attendees or washed in bleach by BLC (e.g. made double-layer in zip-lock bags with instructions for use/clearing). <u>Seating</u> will likely be every other pew or every 3rd pew, with 6-feet on either side of non-family pew "neighbors."*
- Bishop Satterlee and the synod recommends **canceling live**, **in-person VBS**, and BLC will make a decision on this very soon. Annie and Christian Education have explored a virtual alternative to VBS, and we are also exploring **staggering the openings of certain activities and building use** (e.g. maybe worship opens first, in abbreviated fashion; then regular office hours; then opening the building to other tenants/groups, etc.)

According to our local health department, extra precautions and arrangements will likely need to be in place until a good COVID-19 vaccine is in place – likely 6 months to 18 months away, depending on medical data, effectiveness and speed. We have 3 rules of thumb: Go slow and methodically. Get feedback beforehand. It's easier to shut down than re-open...The above list **will evolve and is subject to change**, but it's a place to start.

Back to Psalm 23. These are anxious times indeed, but Jesus is with us every step of the way. Psalm 23 is a song about Christ meeting us in four distinct and relevant settings: "*green pastures*" (our pre-COVID-19 days), the "*valley of the shadow*" (today's challenges), the "*table prepared for us*" (when we next gather), *and "in the house of the Lord forever*" (now and always.) So we take comfort, my friends, that The Good Shepherd is walking with us and – with God's help – this is how we overcome. Shalom, and do not be afraid.

Hopefully, by June we will be in a situation where we are able to get together but we will adjust if needed. More information regarding this meeting will be sent out as we get closer to the June 21st date.

As we adjust to the challenges we are dealing with, we have started discussion at Council trying to determine what worship will look like going forward; how to hold services with distancing, what type services, do we hold multiple services, and using online services more frequently. Right now, it is a little difficult to have a plan when things are changing from week to week. On May 1st, the Governor will offer some guidelines and once we have that information we will notify you as to our path forward.

Minutes from the Church Council Meeting of February 18, 2020

CALL TO ORDER: Chuck Ardingo, President, at 6:01 p.m.

OPENING PRAYER: Pastor Paul

ROLL CALL: Tim Fox, Secretary: In attendance: Chuck Ardingo, Pastor Paul Busekist, Phil Anderson, Jan Stretlien, Nancy Downer, Cindy Monroe, Leonard Graf, Mark McPherson, Jim Monroe, Katie Fox and Tim Fox. Excused absence: Annie Slabaugh and Paul Wiemerslage

VISITOR/S OR CONGREGATIONAL COMMENT: Jodi Kelly: Jodi addressed the Council with her thoughts/opinions on the Visions Committee and Worship Renewal Task Force. Jodi's goal with the Worship Renewal Task Force is to make well informed decisions about change. She mentioned the next meeting is 2/25/2020 and that there is not an actual "Chairperson" for the Task Force. She mentioned that they hope to get all Task Force Members on the same page but currently they are not there. Jodi asked that the Council support the Task Force as they need our support. Jodi also mentioned that at times there can be an adversarial vibe within the Task Force. And that the adversarial vibe can slow the solution process.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA: A motion to approve the agenda for the 02/18/2020 Council Meeting, motion to approve by Tim Fox, seconded by Jan Stretlien, motion carried.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES FROM January 21, 2020 COUNCIL MEETING: Motion to approve the minutes as amended by Leonard Graf, seconded by Mark McPherson. Motion carried.

REPORTS:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Chuck Ardingo, President: None: Chuck gave his time for other items on agenda.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor Paul Busekist: 1) Thanked everyone for their support while he was in Arizona for his Continuing Education, which was his Wilderness Responder Training by the National Outdoor Leadership School. 2) Pastor mentioned that Worship Renewal, the Synod Revive Program and Lent were on the forefront of the calendar ahead. 3) Pastor stated that Worship Renewal is not about working less but maintaining sustainability for church and pastor. 4) Synod Revive, we hope to have a Team representing Bethlehem by late Spring. 5) Pastor talked about studying the movie, Jesus' Last Days in the Desert, during Lent. 6) Pastor also informed Council that he was not taking a Saturday off in February because of his time away for Continuing Education.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Katie Fox: Prior to the meeting Katie provided Council with all of her financial reports as of the end of January 2020. 1) Katie stated that attendance for the full year of 2019 had an average of 141, compared to the full year average for 2018 of 153.1. 2) January income was \$25,868 compared to budgeted income of \$33,241. The result of contribution being \$6,005 under budget but we are expecting a rebound in the coming months. 3) January expenses were \$35,820 which was under the budgeted number of \$36,615. This was the result of savings on our heating bill and not having a custodian during that time. 4) January 2020 net results: January was to have a deficit of \$3,374 but BLC actually had a \$9,952 deficit. The increased deficit is primarily attributed to the lower than expected contributions in January. Katie stated that it is far too early in the year to raise alarm over the deficit as one month of results cannot show a trend.

CONSENT CALENDAR: Reports removed from the Consent Calendar: a) Personnel Report b) Membership and Evangelism, c) Stewardship, and d) Christian Care. Reports to be discussed under new business.

OLD BUSINESS:

A. A. Synod Revive (Discussed prior in Pastor's Report.)

NEW BUSINESS

- A. A. JANITORIAL SERVICE: Leonard Graf, Personnel Report: Leonard moved that the Council hire Happy Guy Cleaning & Maintenance as custodian effective February 12, 2020. The compensation will be \$880.00 per month. The Council authorizes the Council President to sign the necessary paperwork to accomplish this. Seconded by Tim Fox. Mark McPherson asked about the contract. Leonard stated it is month to month with a 3month trial. Motion carried.
- B. B. STAFF ADJUSTMENTS/COMPUTER REPLACEMENT: Pastor discussed the computer replacements and the costs. Data transfer to cost \$300 for the 2 computers. A motion by Chuck Ardingo to increase the costs previously approved at \$1,500 by adding \$500, seconded by Cindy Monroe. Motion carried.
- C. At this point of the Council meeting the Council adjourned to Executive Session to discuss Staff Salary Adjustments. Motioned by Leonard Graf, seconded by Tim Fox, motion carried. The Executive Session ended after approximately 15 minutes and we were called by to order per motion by Leonard Graf, seconded by Tim Fox, motion carried. We resumed our regular meeting with Leonard Graf motioning to approve staff adjustments/raises of 3% effective April 1, 2020. Seconded by Chuck Ardingo. There was discussion with Pastor Paul mentioning Worship Renewal and Saturday Worship and needing to have a solution by our April Council meeting. Leonard mentioned that Council is waiting for the Task Force's recommendation. It was then decided that Pastor Paul's raise would be 2%, on his suggestion and agreement. The original motion by Leonard and seconded by Chuck was amended and motion carried.
- D. C. MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM: Cindy Monroe: 1) Cindy motioned to remove from membership: Kathy Begin, D/T Runstrom, T/T Svoboda, K/S Taylor and J Thomas. Seconded by Leonard Graf, motion carried. 2) Cindy mentioned that 4 new members have volunteered to be drivers of new members without transportation. 3) Cindy stated that the black attendance books in the pews will be removed as they are not serving their intended purpose.

D. STEWARDSHIP: Mark McPherson: 1) Stated that Carl Lehto had mentioned that if we have a budget surplus BLC should look at giving back to our community. Chuck Ardingo stated that it was a good idea but that we have to watch the 2020 budget as we move into the year.

VISITOR OR CONGRETIONAL COMMENT: None.

GOOD OF THE ORDER: A time for general/undocumented comments by each Council Member is so desired.

LORD'S PRAYER: The Lord's Prayer was said by all.

ADJOURNMENT: Motion to adjourn by Cindy Monroe and seconded by Leonard Graf, motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT: 7:20 p.m.



March 2020 Financial Results:

March income of \$31,642 was \$1,044 under budgeted income of \$32,686. March expenses of \$32,535 were \$3,177 under budgeted expense of \$30,402. March was budgeted to have a surplus of \$2,284, but BLC had a loss of \$893.

YTD 2020 Financial Results:

YTD income of \$90,761 was \$7,577 under budgeted income of \$98,338. YTD expense of \$99,871 was \$3,315 under budgeted expense of \$103,186. YTD we budgeted to have a deficit of \$4,848 as of the end of March. We actually ended Mach with a deficit of \$9,110 which means we are \$4,262 behind where we budgeted to be at this point in time. This negative variance is primarily due to the lower than expected contributions in January along with the challenges that coronavirus brought in March. As previously noted, expenses were below budget in March which helped the bottom line and we have a smaller deficit in March than we did in February. So there is some sunshine in this report. It is important to remember that the 2020 budget was created in 2019 based on historical performance and our expectations of 2020. Obviously, no one expected these unprecedented times and we will work through it as a congregation.

Our Treasurer, Katie Fox, received an unexpected promotion at work in October 2019 which has increased her workload immensely on top of her Master's studies. This has created a dilemma with her trying balance work, studies and personal life. Thus, she will be resigning as Treasurer effective June 21, 2020 to clear the way for someone with more time to devote to the role. From a time commitment perspective, the BLC Treasurer is required to attend the Finance Committee, Executive Committee, and Council Meeting every month. While there is certainly a time commitment to attend monthly meetings, the Treasurer role affords one the opportunity to gain a thorough understanding of the financial and operations of the church, and at the same time provide critical support to all committees and initiatives of the church.

We will be electing a new Treasurer at the June 2020 Council Meeting. Please reach out to Dave Peppler (<u>dpeppler6088@gmail.com</u> / 231-835-1335) or Katie Fox (<u>kfox513@gmail.com</u> / 231-883-1728) for further details on the position.

We are also looking for additions to our Finance Committee which meets once a month for 1-1.5 hours. It is a great group of people with a wealth of knowledge! Several members have been on the committee for many years and feel it is time to cycle off. Again, contact Dave or Katie with any questions on committee activities.

Have you been trying out some new recipes while you were stuck at home? Are you very anxious to share them with someone? Hoping that church will reopen on May 23/24, BLC has been advised to not have anything food related throughout the month of May. There are spots open for Finger Food Fellowship on Sunday mornings. And if church is not allowed to reopen, please make something you can freeze and we can have some extra treats this summer.

He is Everywhere! April 14, 2020

I was lucky to go to Cornerstone University and be surrounded by professors who were open and embraced their faith in class. The professors in my theatre major were no exception. We would often start classes and shows in prayer, asking God to have our performances not only go well but also reflect our love for Him and to bless Him by using the talents He gave us to tell an amazing story--whatever that story in particular was. Nancy Wagner was one of my favorite instructors within the theatre department. I've lost touch with and don't talk to a majority of my Cornerstone Theatre colleagues--time and the busyness of life has taken its toll--but I do keep up with some of them on Facebook. I've been happily watching Nancy head to Chicago and thrive in that theatre community while also adding things to her filmography here and there...but recently she's been posting a lot about her experiences with having to stay home because of Covid-19.

Her post the other day was something that made me stop and pause to think. In a post about her early experiences with Covid-19 she ended: "God is everywhere: in the tears, in the praise, in the ventilators, in the leaders, in the prayers, in the birds, in the neighbors, in our hearts; we can choose to see Him."

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God is present in those moments too. I think back to another time of upheaval in my life. Writing this blog post has brought back many memories of my time at Cornerstone University. I made some lifelong friends there and have some great memories...but I also have a few negative ones. At the end of my Junior Year it had been announced that the school was going to cut their theatre program. I was angry. I felt abandoned by the university that had said that they cared about me and my future. Sure, they said that anyone who was still in the program would be able to finish if they wanted to stay at Cornerstone, but how could they actually care about my future? They were cutting my program!

Nancy is so right. God is everywhere and sometimes, for some people, it's hard to remember that. Especially during times like this...but He is everywhere! The sun is shining as I'm writing this blog and I'm sitting on my porch at my apartment with my dogs at my feet. God is in the sunshine. He is in the cool breezes that give me a burst of energy as I let the fresh crisp spring air fill my lungs. He's in the little flies that my puppy, Milo, is chasing. He's in this moment of zen. In this moment of peace and tranquility. Had I not read Nancy's post, I would have appreciated this moment sure, but I may not have been reminded of the presence of God in it. We take these moments for granted--especially during a time of upheaval and uncertainty.



I didn't acknowledge it at the time, but God was present in that moment and the moments that followed. Deuteronomy 31:6 (NRSV) says "Be strong and bold; have no fear or dread of them, because it is the Lord your God who goes with you; he will not fail you or forsake you." Although it was a time of great pain for me, God took this moment and gave to me an amazing support system; Nancy included. It was a time of struggle and of me trying to figure out my self worth, but it was also the time where I was able to truly define what I wanted in life. Throughout my entire college career I had said that my dream was opening my own theatre, or working in some sort of theatre management...when I found myself presented at these crossroads I realized I didn't want that after all. I didn't know what I wanted anymore and that left me in a strange new limbo. I was afraid and not sure how to process the pain and abandonment I was feeling from my university...but also the abandonment of what I thought was my lifelong dream.

It was around that time that God led me to my first "big girl" job at Comprehensive Physical Therapy Center in Grand Rapids, MI. During this transitional time in my life God used this position to show me the path that He had laid out for me. To serve others. To serve and love those who God has placed in this world. A few things happened here and there in between, but ultimately, this calling of service is what led me here to Bethlehem.

This time is uncertain and scary, but God is present. He's here and He's with us. Things may be different going forward but that doesn't mean that it's the end.

There will be new opportunities that come from this time, although we may not see it right away. Whenever I am feeling down or upset, I take a moment to remember that God is with me and that He will never leave my side. These moments are so incredibly crucial to help me get by. If anyone reading this is feeling down, just remember...God's with you, and He will never abandon you!

Thinking about Trust April 15, 2020



Safe Harbor: 2019-2020 Season Overview

April 17, 2020

Safe Harbor of Grand Traverse is a seasonal, overnight shelter for those experiencing homelessness who have exhausted their other options. Beginning in 2004-2005 as a rotating shelter among area churches, we have now completed three full years of operation in our shelter building at 517 Wellington. Following is the Operational overview for the 2019-2020 shelter season.

This season we averaged 70 guests per night, up from last year's average of 67 per night. This average included 320 individuals, a few of whom only stayed for one or two nights and a few of whom stayed most of the season. Our peak number of guests was 87 on March 3 which exceeded our bed capacity of 82 with overflow guests sleeping on mats on the floor. We continue to provide guests with a warm dinner, a bed, a blanket and a tote for belongings. Showers, laundry facilities, cell phone charging and computer access are also available along with television, games and books during evening hours. In the morning, guests are provided a simple breakfast prior to departure. We continued our partnership with Goodwill of Northern Michigan to provide trained supervisory staff during all hours of operation and a second staff member during the critical early hours of each night's operation. Goodwill continued to have their Street Outreach staff present each evening to interview new guests to determine if Safe Harbor was their best option and to register them, if they wish, for a confidential homeless transition service. Through this service, a number of guests transitioned to permanent housing during the year.

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We continued our relationships with the City government, the Traverse City Police department, the surrounding neighborhood and businesses, the Library and other organizations that provide services to those experiencing homelessness, including Jubilee House and Central United Methodist Church. Safe Harbor continues to host quarterly meetings with neighborhood representatives and participates in the meetings of the North Boardman Lake District business owners.

During March our operations were impacted by the Coronavirus pandemic. We added a heated tent in the parking lot to spread out guests during dining and social activities and enable spreading the guests out more during sleeping hours. Even with these improvements, the Board made a tough decision to close seasonal overnight operations a half month early on April 1 to reduce the risk of Coronavirus exposure for our guests in close quarters. We worked closely with our Goodwill partners to provide alternative temporary housing for the most vulnerable of our guests.

In response to the closure of many services available to our guests during the Coronavirus outbreak, Safe Harbor and Goodwill worked together to open a Temporary Day Shelter at the Safe Harbor facility. This Temporary Day Shelter is providing afternoon access to bathrooms, showers, laundry, phone charging and computer access. Open three hours each afternoon this Temporary Day Shelter will continue to operate until normal services, such as Jubilee House, Central United Methodist and the Library, can resume operation.

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Prior to opening this season, the building was enhanced with sound dampening materials in the dining and social area which provided a calmer atmosphere for our guests and volunteers. *(see next page)*

In addition, we added a mural to one wall of the dining room which visually enhanced the atmosphere and reduced the "institutional" feel of the building.

Twenty-two different congregations contributed to the operation of the shelter during this season, with two new congregations participating. The weekly rotation approach was preserved with greater emphasis on cooperative scheduling between multiple congregations and/or community volunteers.

The Safe Harbor Board of Directors, with assistance of a strategic planner, developed a second three year Strategic Plan during January and February. We will begin work on the goals identified in that Plan during the Summer of 2020.


We also approved a plan for moving forward on development of the adjacent property at 570 Station Street. The property will eventually be developed partially as supportive housing for those experiencing homelessness. The development and operation of that housing will be handed off to other organizations.

Safe Harbor continues to be almost totally funded by generous donations from the supporting churches and individuals from our community. We are not supported by funds from the Government or tax dollars.

The numbers from our first three seasons dramatically demonstrate the inadequacy of affordable housing in Traverse City and the functionality of a central shelter location which is walk-able from the library, the outreach services provided at Central United Methodist Church, and other services for those experiencing homelessness. The housing office in the front of the shelter has provided year-round transitioning assistance to our guests, but its effectiveness is limited by various factors, not least of which is an inadequate supply of affordable housing.



Saving our Pollinators

We all know the importance of our plants being pollinated. Our fruits and vegetables depend on pollination to mature. NEONICS are chemicals put on plants to prevent insects from attacking them. The danger in this is that all insects including bees (our most important pollinator) are killed. This is often done in the green house that grow them from seeds to the plants that we buy. Because of the danger Neonics present, many green houses have stopped using them. This includes not only the nurseries who grow their own plants from seed, but also some of the wholesalers who supply big box stores. It is easy to ask if plants were ever treated with neonics. This is one way we can be good stewards of our planet for our children.

There are other things to remember when we choose what to plant. One is that native plants usually not only thrive in this area, but fit well in our ecosystem benefits the insects and animals that naturally live here. Another is that nature loves variety. Having only a green lawn is not variety. Lastly we need to think about the chemicals that we put on our plants to encourage growth or discourage insects.


