Friends, it's that time of year again! This is the time when we put on our "stewardship shoes" and talk about our time, talents and treasure. But I would like to suggest that **this year is unique, for two reasons**: For one, as you can see in Chuck's bold and challenging message, 2020 will involve a financial pinch for all of us. At the same time, we are embarking on a new vision together. Keeping in mind and heart the TRUE bread of life (Christ), this year we hope to approach our 2020 Stewardship Campaign with the theme of **nourishment**: for God's vision and mission, with our efforts, in these **three unique aspects**:

"Nourishing" Week One, Oct. 12/13:

"Developing the Plan" (leaders!)
This first week we will focus on the need to seek 3 to 5 new volunteers to help us realize our financial goals in 2020:

- A legacy giving point person (for families proactively exploring how to honor a loved one's legacy at Bethlehem)
- One or two grant writers (helping Bethlehem seek and apply for larger outside grants or smaller, Thrivent-type grants, for specialized ministry in 2020)
- Possible BLC ambassadors in synod's "Revive" visioning program (or another such program TBD), working alongside the Bethlehem Visions committee in the months and years ahead

(Stay tuned for the November STAR's revisiting of our stewardship and vision focus!)

"Nourishing" Week Two, Oct. 19/20:

"Shepherding the Flock" (narrative!)
Week 2 will focus on the need to share our
thoughts, dreams and vision into the near
future, keeping our eyes and ears open:

- Shoring up the needs of today (balancing our budget, reaching out to members and guests in new ways)
- Keeping our dreams of new staffing alive (will we gather momentum on seeking an additional pastor, intern or other scenario in the next 1-2 years? Is there a different staffing or ministry configuration that excites us more?)

"Nourishing" Week Three, Oct. 26/27: "Tending the Soil" (special focus areas!)

The third and final week we focus on the pinpointing one or two specialized areas, *perhaps* not able to be included in the budget, for Bethlehem to increase or at least maintain its ministry. If specialized giving, this could be for folks who would like to give to areas that are unsustainable otherwise, as we make hard budgetary choices in 2020. This may include:

- Re-examining the way we provide things like Advent and Lent programming and our 3 distinct weekly worship services at BLC and how we might continue those unique avenues of evangelism to the larger community, balancing our staff's energy and church resources
- Supporting our building and grounds through challenging innovations or raising money (perhaps "on the side") to help replenish our Asset Replacement fund and/or help provide routine or specialized upkeep and maintenance in ways we could not otherwise afford

Moving Forward / Hard Choices

Greetings to All,

I want to start off this month with taking a moment to revisit Rally Sunday on September 8th. Sometimes when multiple events happen we do not give enough thanks to those who work so hard to make BLC the special place that it is. Rally Sunday was the beginning of a new Sunday School year for our kids. Our Christian Education program and its leaders, teachers and volunteers do an outstanding job of developing and providing our kids with a strong Christian foundation. The program not only provides education but also teaches outreach in our Community. This year our Kids went to Bryant Park, across the street from our church, to participate in a clean up. The event was intended as an outreach and help our kids understand that we can do things in our community to make it better for everyone. Thank you Kids, leaders, teachers and volunteers for doing a great job!

The Visions Committee also launched its program on September 8th. Visiting Pastor Adam helped to kick off the project by visiting BLC and assisted with the weekend Services.

Our Visions Committee has a large challenge moving forward. The Committee has embarked on a project that has never been done before at BLC. They are growing and developing a program from scratch. As with any program that does not have any prior guidelines, the Committee is trying to develop a commonality that will provide our Church with a path forward to our future. As the Committee moves forward they, will be trying new ideas, some will be successful, others ideas may not, its part of the process. I encourage everyone to realize that finding a Vision will take time and to allow the Committee to work through its process.

One other thing that I will comment on is the recent survey. The Visions Committee, in trying to gather some information from the Congregation, created a survey to find a starting point. In that survey, strong opinions, positive and negative were expressed and that is fine. What does not add any value is some of the **disrespectful** comments provided. The Visions Committee understood that not all surveys are perfect, but some of the mean spirited comments that were made have no place in finding a positive Vision forward for BLC.

Moving on, this is the time of year when we work through our Budget for the coming year. At the time of writing this article we are showing a deficit in the 20K range for 2020. As I have shared with you last month, we will most likely need to make some hard choices moving forward. Council got its first look at the 2020 budget at the last Council meeting and will now begin to determine a financial plan for 2020. It is entirely possible that there may be some discomfort in next year's plan. The Finance Committee has provided a financial forecast for the short term and has noted that if we continue to deficit spend, within the next two years we may... (please turn the page...)

have difficulty making expenses. Please keep in mind this is a snapshot of where we are at today and things can change.



Bethlehem Visions Committee October 2019

In May of this year, Pastor Paul talked about "Forks in the Road". He touched on Fork One, staffing for Bethlehem and Fork Two, casting a new vision for the church. The survey was originally designed to determine the level of congregational and financial support for new staffing and the understanding of the term, "Teaching Congregation". It was later expanded to include questions about programing (What We are Doing Well and Not So Well) and new ministry areas the congregation thinks we should develop. We received 94 surveys from the congregation out of a potential population of about 250.

The following is a partial summary of the survey findings from both the on-line and written versions.

Ranking of the Top Three Current Programs or Activities
Christian Education
Youth Programming
New Member Recruitment and Retention

Interest in an Intern at BLC 5.8 out of a possible 10

<u>Interest in a Part-Time, Semi-Retired Pastor</u> 6.3 out of a possible 10

Comfortable with the term "Teaching Congregation" concept Yes – 41% Not sure or some other type of negative answer – 59%

Minutes from the Church Council Meeting of August 20, 2019

CALL TO ORDER: Churck Ardingo, President, at 6:01 p.m.

OPENING PRAYER: Cindy Monroe: Isaiah 41 Verse 10. "Do not Fear I am With You".

ROLL CALL: Tim Fox, Secretary: In attendance, Pastor Paul Busekist, Phil Anderson, Jan Stretlien, Nancy Downer, Cindy Monroe, Leonard Graf, Mark McPherson, Chuck Ardingo, Jim Monroe, Katie Fox, Paul Wiemerslage and Tim Fox

VISITOR/S OR CONGREGATIONAL COMMENT: None.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA: A motion to approve the agenda for the 8/20/2019 meeting was made by Mark McPherson and seconded by Cindy Monroe. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES FROM THE July 16,2019 COUNCIL MEETING: Motion to approve the minutes by Leonard Graf, seconded by Jan Stretlien. Motion carried.

REPORTS:

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Chuck Ardingo, President: 1) 2019 Budget completed by end of October. 2) Deficit spending is an issue and we have difficult choice going forward.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor Paul Busekist: 1) Verbal report for this meeting but goal is for a written report. 2) Pastor spoke on the January email asking, what are you involved in? 3) Pastor mentioned he will send an email on the Survey and to be sure that you fill out a survey, 100 surveys completed is the goal. BLC needs the surveys to know what you want of BLC. Cindy Monroe mentioned the first question of setting rankings for programs of BLC. Cindy also mentioned that having a computer available on Sunday for members to use to complete the survey. Mark McPherson suggested having the youth of BLC to help input the paper surveys into Survey Monkey. 4) Pastor spoke of his continuing education in Arizona that it will be the 3rd week of November 16th-22nd. 5) There was discussion of Pastor Adam coming to BLC on Friday, 9/6 and 6:00 P.M. until 7:30 P.M., with a working dinner. 9/8 after the late service there will be a Congregational forum with a lunch from 12:30 – 2:00 sharp. 6) As of this meeting we have only 50 surveys submitted by the congregation, which is a concern with a membership of 300 plus. Pastor mentioned that he hopes that the Holy Spirit can work in us to provide more excitement. Chuck Ardingo then went around the table as asked the Council Members what they are excited about regarding the survey results and vision. 7) Pastor asked, how can we innovate and cover all bases on the Saturday service. Meredith, Pastor's wife, now works Fridays, so no family day. Saturday may have to be that "family day". This would be selfcare for Pastor. Cindy asked could the Saturday service move to another day of the week.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Katie Fox: 1) Prior to the meeting Katie submitted to full Council her July income, expense, YTD income, YTD expense and attendance reports. 1) Attendance was down 6 average year to date as of the August meeting. 2) July was budgeted to have a surplus of \$1,752. The actual deficit was \$1,012. This was a decrease of \$2,764 against budget. The bottom line in July was challenged by lower than expected contributions, unexpected repairs and personnel expenses. 3) YTD we budgeted to have a surplus of \$4,561 as of the end of July. We ended July with a surplus of \$3,475 which means we are \$1,086

behind where we budgeted to be at this time. Contributions being under budget and unexpected expenses continue to challenge the bottom line. 4) Leonard Graf asked if we can change the Gross Profit Account title to Gross Income, as we are a non-profit. Katie to research. 5) Budget numbers can be given to Katie either in hard copy or electronically. 6) The Budget Worksheets given to chairpersons show first 7 months of actual numbers and the remaining 5 months as budget numbers. 7) Asset Replacement is being funded by the Memorial Funds. 8) Katie asked that the first draft of budget be submitted by Monday, 9/9, at the start of business. A full first draft will be discussed at the September Council Meeting. 9) The modification of numbers by 9/30, regarding budget. 10) Final budget Classification: Internal Use due 10/08. The goal is to vote 10/15 at Council. Dave Peppler, finance committee chairperson, spoke on the theory and reasoning of the above schedule for completing the 2019 Budget. 11) Dave said we don't want it as messy as last year. 11) Each chairperson is responsible for their committee budget. 12) Phil Anderson asked about administrative budget, Dave stated the he will work on it with Katie. 13) It was mentioned that Nancy Ammann is the Christian Education chairperson and hopefully will handled budget numbers. 14) Pastor asked during the budget process not to forget Stewardship Campaign, Vision Campaign and alternative revenue streams. 15) Phil Anderson to provide budget numbers should there be an Intern Pastor. 15) Regarding the rental property, Chuck Ardingo mentioned that the property will stay with BLC as we need the \$11,000 in income. Selling the property is off the table. We need look at the repair needs and we are talking to contractors regarding repair costs.

CONSENT CALENDAR: Reports asked to be removed from the Consent Calendar were as follows: Membership and Evangelism, to be discussed in New Business and Stewardship. Leonard Graf motioned to remove and seconded by Tim Fox. Motion carried. Stewardship: Mark McPherson stated that there would be a Stewardship meeting on 8/28 at 3:00 and he invited any of Council that would like to attend. He will also be emailing Barb Wright regarding the meeting and upcoming Jubilee service.

OLD BUSINESS

A. REIMAGINING COUNCIL AND COMMITTEE: Chuck Ardingo: 1) Chuck stated possibly 11 Council members not connected to a committee by June of 2020. Leonard Graf suggested we make the change at the winter Congregational meeting. It would be a By-Law change. Cindy Monroe voiced her concern with no Council member tied to a committee. 2) Chuck stated his concern that there are not enough people to work/volunteer for Advent and Lenten meals and no mentoring program. Mark McPherson agreed with Chuck, stating for himself being on Council he can do it, but being the chair of Stewardship, he cannot. Chuck stated the big challenge is recruiting people. Pastor Paul stated that some Churches have moved committees into teams that meet four times a year. Paul Wiemerslage asked how do we make BLC vibrant. Paul mentioned having Sunday School at the same time of a service may bring in members and fit current members better. Cindy Monroe mentioned that BLC used to have Sunday School during service. There was mention of cutting the Saturday service and having 2 Sunday services. Pastor mentioned that there was a great amount of time used by the youth director for youth summer camp and there were only 2 youths from BLC attending. Chuck reiterated that we may not have Advent and Lenten meals without staff for the meals. Cindy Monroe suggest having small group handle various meals. Mark McPherson suggested we look at the survey results, then look at size of Council, Teams and Groups. Pastor spoke of a raising new leaders event/retreat. Paul Wiemerslage mentioned a goal of new members, new leaders and to be involved outside of our Church to get the word out about BLC. Mark McPherson then mentioned partnering with another Church for Saturday service. Chuck Ardingo stated that the above mentioned are great food for thought over the next month.

B. MARRIAGE POLICY: Chuck Ardingo: 1) Small venue beer and wine, host family has the liability. 2) Small venue not to exceed 75 people. 3) Chuck to write a policy for Council approval.

C. POLICY ON GUNS AND POLITICS: Chuck Ardingo: 1) Solicitation only on sidewalk by street is acceptable regarding anything outside of BLC information. 2) Chuck is looking to put together an Active Shooter Committee, then write a policy for Council approval.

NEW BUSINESS

A. BUDGET OF 2020: Previously discussed.

- B. 3 rd CHARITY SELECTION: The Salvation Army was selected as the charity. Motioned by Nancy Downer. Seconded by Tim Fox. Motion carried. Classification: Internal Use
- C. VISION'S UPDATE: Phil Anderson: 1) Phil mentioned that the Visions Committee has been hard at work with Pastor Paul on the groundwork for our vision of BLC in the next three to five years. 2) The Visions Committee has been having FaceTime conference calls with Pastor Adam as we prepare for his visit in September. 3) Surveys to be completed and due no later than August 25th. The committee will meet August 27th to compile and analyze the results. A written report will be shared with Pastor Adam and the congregation as soon as possible.
- D. Membership and Evangelism: Cindy Monroe: 1) Cindy spoke regarding Church Trac and showing who was using Church Trac and the date. Also, that that staff person enter in staff notes who and when they were in Church Trac. 2) Cindy motioned and submitted to Council to remove from active membership Bernie/Helen Lutz, Russ/Sally Miller, Rita Kucera and Bob/Jackie Epps. Seconded by Chuck Ardingo. Motion carried.
- E. ELCA RESOLUTION ON SOCIAL STATEMENT: Pastor Paul: 1) Pastor spoke regarding looking out for the forgotten. ELCA being a sanctuary denomination, trying to help people. Phil Anderson mentioned that it is a resolution and non-binding. Pastor Paul mentioned it is up to each congregation to decide.

VISITOR OR CONGREGATIONAL COMMENT: None

GOOD OF THE ORDER: A time for general/undocumented comments by each Council Member is so desired.

LORD'S PRAYER: The Lord's Prayer was said by all.

ADJOURNMENT: A motion to adjourn by Cindy Monroe, seconded by Leonard Graf. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:36 P.M,

Council Secretary's Comments Regarding The September Council Meeting

I know you will see the September Council Minutes after they are approved by Council at the October meeting, but, I still want to give you my thoughts regarding a couple of subjects at the September meeting.

First, Sarah Denton, our Nursery Coordinator during services, attended our Council meeting and addressed the Council during the Visitor/Congregational Comments portion of the agenda. Sarah has a passion for all children to have a safe and healthy childhood. That being said, she asked Council to approve the Children's Advocacy Center's use of our fellowship hall for a training class that would be available to both members and non-members of the community. The class would take place in the spring of 2020 and have 35-40 participants and last for approximately 2 hours. Council approved of the use for Children's Advocacy Center and at no charge.

Second, Chuck Ardingo, our President of Council, mentioned that the Funeral Group has added a couple of volunteers, which is great news, as we are in great need of volunteers.

Lastly, we, your Council, are working hard on the 2020 Budget, reviewing avenues of additional income for 2020 and expense cuts for 2020. I will keep you posted on the Budget process as we move forward.

August & YTD 2019 Financial Results:

August income of \$23,608 was \$1,741 under budgeted income of \$25,349. August expense of \$36,748 was \$1,848 under budgeted expense of \$38,596. August was budgeted to have a deficit of \$13,247. The month was almost right on budget with an actual deficit of \$13,140. The bottom line in August was challenged by lower than expected contributions, maintenance, and repairs.

YTD income of \$251,580 was \$1,268 above budgeted income of \$250,312.

YTD expense of \$261,227 was \$2,229 over budgeted expense of \$258,998.

YTD we budgeted to have a deficit of \$8,686 as of the end of August. We ended August with a deficit of \$9,650 which means we are \$964 behind where we budgeted to be at this point in time. Contributions under budget YTD and large unexpected expenses continue to challenge the bottom line, but some ground was made up in August due to lower than expected expenses for the month.

To net this out, after the first eight months of the year we have deficit cash flow of \$9,650. Our budget over the remaining four months shows a surplus cash flow of \$1,478. Said another way, we will have a deficit of \$8,171 at year end compared to the \$7,208 deficit that was originally projected. This of course assumes our giving stabilizes and non-operating income levels remain strong along with no additional large unexpected expenses.

Your Amazon Purchases Can Generate Contributions to BLC

Do you shop at Amazon? If so, you can generate a contribution to BLC from the AmazonSmile Foundation by using the *smile.amazon.com* website when you place an order. Here's how you can make it happen.

First. Using your web browser, sign in to Amazon using the *smile.amazon.com* address. This website looks and acts like the regular Amazon website. Your Amazon account and the procedures for purchasing are identical to what you've always used. The first time you use this site, you will be invited to pick a charitable organization to receive donations from the Foundation. To select BLC, enter *Bethlehem Lutheran Church Traverse City* in the organization search box, and select it when the search results are displayed. BLC only recently became an organization listed by Amazon. Perhaps you've used *smile.amazon.com* before and named another charity to receive your donations. If you wish, you can easily change your designated charity to BLC, by simply selecting "Change your Charity" in "Your Account."

Second. Each time you sign in to Amazon use the *smile.amazon.com* address. Only orders placed on this website will generate donations. The donation will be 0.5% of the purchase price of qualified items. Amazon states that "tens of millions" of items qualify to generate donations and those items are marked "Eligible for AmazonSmile donation" on their product detail pages. You will not pay more when you purchase such items. Once you have used the *smile.amazon.com* address a few times, merely typing *smile* in the address box may cause the browser to automatically fill in the complete *smile.amazon.com* address.

If you wish to use your smart phone rather than your computer, please note the following restriction: Using the Amazon app on your smart phone always directs you to the regular website, and purchases made there do not generate donations. On your smart phone, you must use the standard web browser and enter the address *smile.amazon.com* to generate donations.


